


2019 AB Labour Market Review

General AB Workforce/Economy Information

 In 2020, Alberta is predicted to surge to first place from last place among the provinces in terms of economic growth. (Conference Board of Canada, 2019)




- In 2018, there were almost 300,000 more jobs created within AB than in 2007, despite the recession that hit alberta in 2015/16.
 - o 18% of all jobs created in Canada were within Alberta during this time
- There was an increase of over 50,000 jobs between 2015 to 2019
- Growing future economy impossible without immigration into AB
- Alberta unemployment rate drops a full percent from 2016, now at 6.8%
- AB Trucking Industry is thriving, but in desperate need of workers
- \$191M over five years to support jobs in the softwood lumber industry
- The average annual unemployment rate in Alberta from 2007-2017 was 5.6% compared to 7% for the national average.
- According to BMO, Alberta's economy will expand by 2.5 percent in 2020

Construction Forecast – Heavy Equipment Operators

- Utilities saw 14.8% increase in number of jobs in 2018.
- As of April 2019, crude oil at roughly \$59 per barrel, forecasted to hit \$70 per barrel by 2021
- The 2018-2027 outlook scenario projects that total constructions employment will decline in 2018 before broader growth returns and gains momentum gaining 8,300 jobs by 2027
- By 2027, 19% of the current construction workforce will be lost to retirement
- The housing industry started to recover at the end of 2017, helping to offset declines in oil-andgas investment




Figure 1: Alberta oil sands investment – construction, machinery, and equipment (millions of 2007 dollars*)



^{* \$2007} millions indicates that the investment values are in year 2007 dollars (base year), that is, adjusted for inflation. This is used to calculate the real physical year-to-year change of the value of construction, factoring out growth (increase value) due to increases in prices.

"The MPI lists construction projects in AB valued at \$5 million or greater including a status category: Proposed, Under Construction, Completed, or On Hold. Project information is obtained from public and private information sources (AB, 2019).


• A total of 102 projects are currently under construction or being planned over the next 10 years in Alberta (representing \$178B in investment)

- Energy project account for more that 90 percent of the major project investment within the province
- Notable is the 72 planned energy projects for 2019 and beyond worth \$143B
- In January 2019, there were 21 projects recently added to the MPI list with a combined value of \$2.6B
- There are 6 projects with a combined value of 132.7M which began construction in January of 2019
 - o Lister Centre Complex (Edmonton) \$81M
 - Emergency Operations Center (Edmonton)\$18.2M
 - Hillcrest Lodge Expansion (Barrhead) \$17.5M
 - Whoop-up Drive Bridge (Lethbridge) -\$5.5M
